

11 General Orders:

- 1. To take charge of this post and all government property in view.
- 2. To walk my post in a military manner, keeping always on then alert and observing everything that takes place within sight or hearing.
- 3. To report all violations of orders I am instructed to enforce.
- 4. To repeat all calls from posts more distant from the guardhouse than my own.
- 5. To quit my post only when properly relieved.
- 6. To receive, obey, and pass on to the sentry who relieves me, all orders from the commanding officer, officer of the day, and officers and noncommissioned officers of the guard only.
- 7. To talk to no one except in line of duty.
- 8. To give the alarm in case of fire or disorder.
- 9. To call the corporal of the guard in any case not covered by instructions.
- 10. To salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased.
- 11. To be especially watchful at night, and during the time for challenging, to challenge all persons on or near my post and to allow no one to pass without proper authority.

Measurements:


- Ranks: ½ inch from the collar and centered
- <u>Ribbons:</u> Centered ½ inch above and parallel to the top of the upper left breast pocket
- <u>Badges:</u> Centered ½ inch above and parallel to the top of the upper left breast pocket
- Web Belt: 2"- 4" from the end of the buckle to the tip of the belt
- <u>Haircut:</u> 0"-3" fade, sideburns to not be below the orifice of the ear, tapered or flared, or exceeding ½ inch when fully extended


Flag Knowledge:


- Types of Flags: Storm, Post, and Garrison
- Measurements: Storm= 5ft by 9ft, Post= 10ft by 19ft, Garrison= 20ft by 38ft
- Representation: Red= Hardiness and Valor,
 White= Purity and Innocence, Blue= Vigilance,
 Preservation and Justice
- <u>Purpose:</u> Storm= Hung when there is a storm over a military post. Post= Used to simply identify a military post and symbolize the location and significance of a location in which the US military has established camp.
 Garrison= One of the largest American Flags used on special occasions.
